COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course emphasizes the basic concepts and factors of world affairs and the dynamics of world politics and global businesses through varying approaches and theories. It aims on the development of competency to critically evaluate global relations and international events and identification of problems and issues of international politics and businesses. The course also aims to develop international communication competence and skills to critically review international relations in order to be able to communicate strategically and review global business practices.

OBJECTIVES

The objectives of this course are:

- to review international history from the perspective of international relations
- to introduce the concepts and theories of international relations and understand the main approaches to the study of international relations
- to understand the international system and issues that influence on the behaviour of states and businesses
- to understand the relationship between theory and policy-making in international surroundings
- to develop international communication competence in order to be able to review international relations and global business critically

TEACHING METHODS

The course will consist of lectures, classroom assignments and discussions, case studies, a special topic presentation and home work.

Students are expected to finish all the reading assignments before class. All assignments are to be handed in as hard copies.

Course content will come from a variety of sources: reading assignments, short written assignments, and handout materials.
